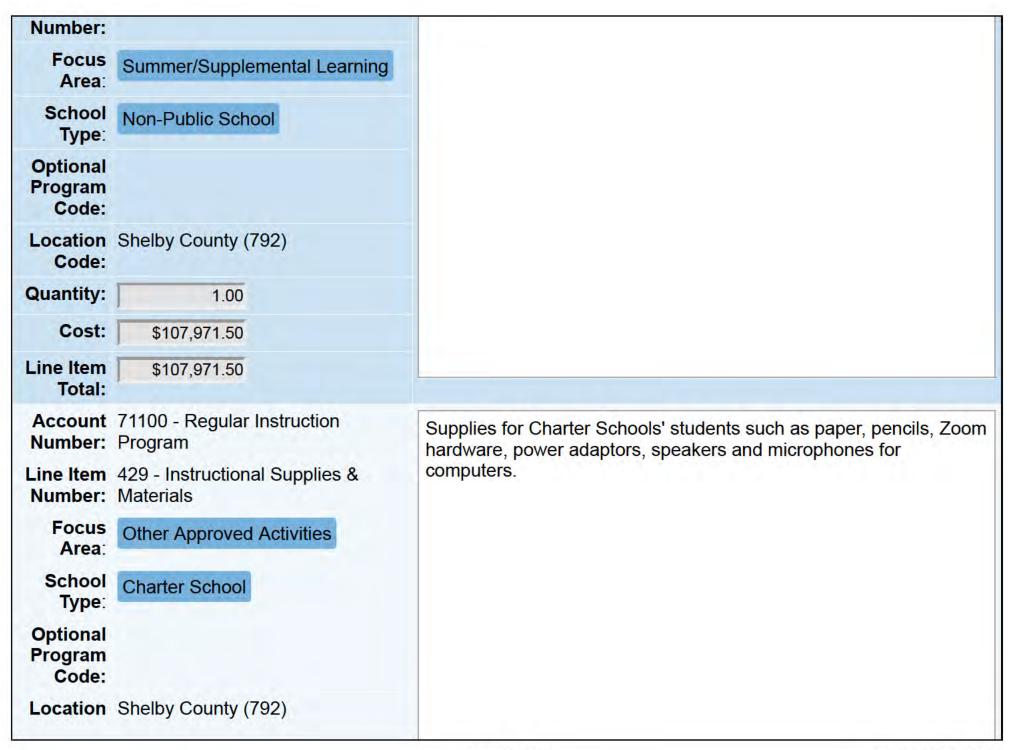

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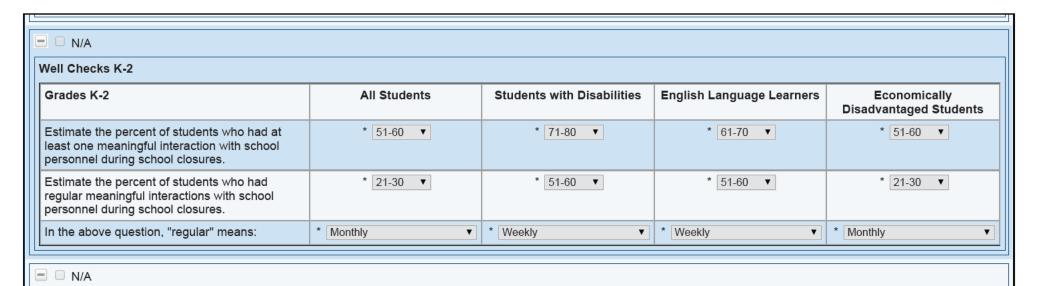

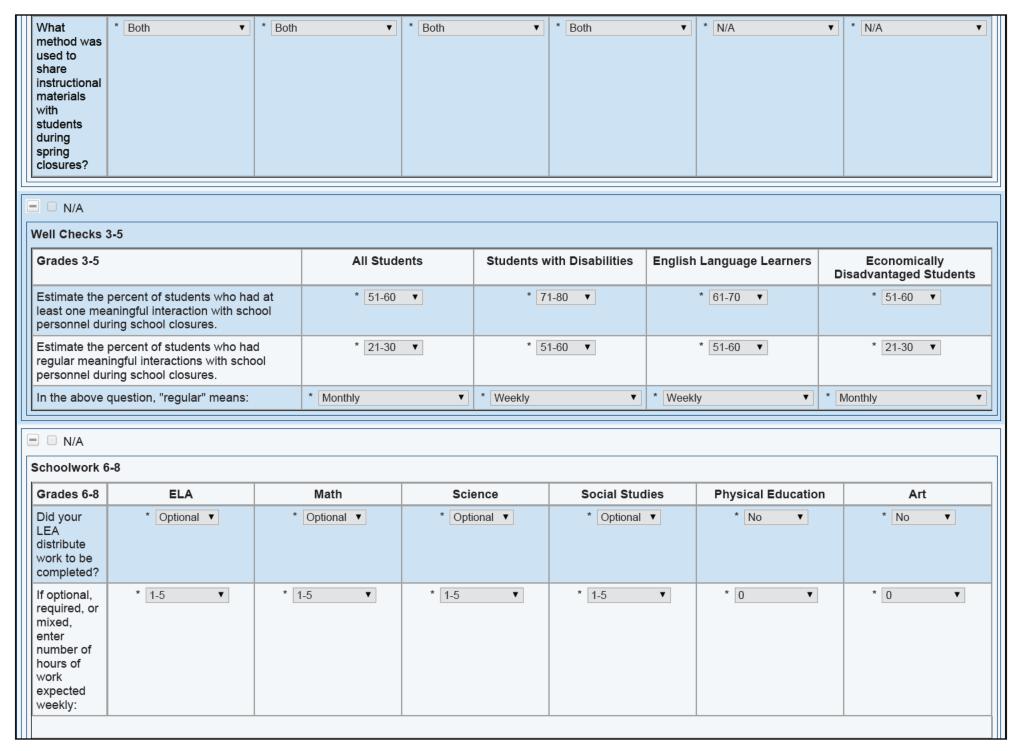

#### Reflect on Data

\* What are the LEA's plans for measuring student progress given the data provided above?

In order to measure student progress and to provide insight about the knowledge and skills that students have as they begin the 2020-2021 school year, the teachers will administer a district-created diagnostic assessment during the first 20 days of school. The diagnostic assessment will be created by the Curriculum & Instruction Department using the Mastery Connect platform. Items on the diagnostic will assess major work of the grade and foundational standards from the previous grade level. For example, the 4th grade mathematics diagnostic will assess the major work of the grade from 3rd grade mathematics. Teachers will use the data from the diagnostic in order to determine which standards and skills that will need to be reinforced from the previous grade level, while also planning for new student learning for the current grade level.

\* How does the LEA intend to address learning gaps resulting from the disruption of educational services? (CARES Act § 18003 (B))

Learning gaps will be addressed in several different ways. Below are specific strategies that will be used.

- · Virtual summer school Select students will engage in virtual summer school led by Shelby County Schools' teachers. Virtual summer school will be offered during June July 2020.
- Right on time approach During the 2020-2021 school year, learning gaps will be addressed at the most appropriate time in the curriculum pacing so that as teachers are addressing loss of learning, there is a natural progression of lessons and activities in order to provide students with coherent learning opportunities. The district's Curriculum & Instruction Department and Professional Learning & Support Department are providing recommendations, additional resources, and trainings for teachers to help the maneuver the process of planning for using the right on time approach.
- Teacher- led extended learning opportunities In some instances, learning gaps will be addressed through the use of extended learning opportunities such as Saturday school. Based on the results of student performance on the district's diagnostic assessment, along with other in-class student performance data, students will be identified to participate in Saturday school.
- · Self-paced, technology-based extended learning For some students, the most appropriate and effective away to address learning gaps is to provide opportunities for self-paced, technology-based learning experiences.
- \* Briefly describe how your district conducted checks on students (academically, non-academically/development/etc.). Include frequency of checks, number of students, and any other details.

In order to maintain the connection with students and parents, the district conducted checks on students in various ways.

- District-wide surveys: During the months of April and May, each principal was given specific directions and guidance on how to lead his/her staff with conducting surveys with each student. Each teacher was asked to call his/her students and ask a series of district-prepared survey questions so that the district could collect data about students' access to technology, use of district provided-learning resources during the school closure, and to confirm students' correct contact information is on file. Teachers submitted logs for each call that was made, and they submitted the names of students who they were unable to connect with via phone calls or emails. Below is the breakdown of the number of students with whom connections were made during the survey period.
- o Elementary 37,071
- o K 8 and Middle Schools 13.351
- o High Schools 15.252

- o Total responses 65,674
- Piloting of Microsoft Teams classes: Select schools participated in a pilot where teachers delivered instruction via Teams using a prescribed school day schedule. 17 schools participated in the pilot which lasted for one week.
- Monitoring student engagement with on-line resources: Each week starting in late March, the Office of Academics monitored student log-ins to on-line resources through Clever. There were over 423,741 student log-ins during the months of March May. These log-ins represented students in grades K 12.
- **Exceptional Children:** Special Education Teachers, Case Managers, and related service providers (OTs, PTs, Speech Therapists, Nurses) conducted frequent checks with students via the following modalities: email, Microsoft Teams, Google Classroom, telephone calls, text messages, limited in-person social distancing, teletherapy, telehealth, etc. Individualized Students Support Plans developed to document support provided to students.

The Department of Exceptional Children and Health Services created a specific "Learn at Home" website which can be found at <a href="https://www.edugoodies.com">www.edugoodies.com</a>. This website included instructional packets, instructional videos, social emotional resources, and accessible links for online district platforms such as i-Ready, Discovery Education, Edgenuity, Transition to Adulthood, etc. Additionally, instructional packets were made available to students at meal distribution sites. When requested, instructional packets were delivered to the homes of students. Additionally, the department made efforts to provide technology devices to students to ensure equitable access to online platforms.

Virtual IEP meetings were held to maintain compliance and to address the concerns of the students, families, and members of the IEP team. IEP meetings to determine initial eligibility for special education were also held. Students and parents were contacted to participate in assessments and evaluations that did not require face to face interaction.

Special Education Teachers, Case Managers, and Related Service Providers were required to report weekly information as indicated below.

• English Learners: Checks on the district's 8,884 English Learners via phone calls were directed from the ESL department. Phone calls were initiated from ESL teachers, Bilingual Mentors and Bilingual Counselors to inform families about the following: the distribution of optional work packets, meal distribution sites, the SCS Covid-19 website, online ESL optional resources for students, as well as access to a website to assist in the development of parent and community English language. School specific checks to ELs were initiated as directed by school principals.

- SEED: The SEED office, which includes the Mental Health Center, Counselors, 504 Advisors, and Enrollment teams have launched an SEL Support line to provide families with live information, resources, and teletherapy from our licensed mental health clinicians. In order to provide graduating Senior students with information about next steps and support, Counselors and Social Workers hosted 90+ meetings on Microsoft TEAMS to answer questions and listen to student concerns. These sessions were made available for all 6,900+ students. Individual calls have been made to all 1,800 students served under Section 504. Counselor and Social Worker check-in calls have been made to 25,000+ Tier 2 and 3 students. A pre-recorded 24- hour information line was established in English and Spanish to provide information and resources on topic such as Anxiety, Depression, Suicide Prevention, Anger Management, and COVID-19 resources. Over the course of the last two months, more than 500 calls from students and parents have been made to the support lines for assistance. A bi-weekly Newsletter is created by SEED and published in Teacher Weekly to encourage teachers and provide them with SEL resources and tips. SEL Resources are published on the District's website, as well as videos for parents and students. SCS Counselors and Social Workers have also created SEL lessons that can be viewed on C-19 TV.
- Family and Community Engagement: Through the District's social media channels, staff (e.g., Family Engagement Associates, Specialists, Advisors) engaged in meaningful two-way communication with families by sharing information and resources on Coronavirus facts and testing, meal service and local food distribution, and home learning activities. Additionally, the daily Homework Hotline phone, text, and web chat services were extended to provide academic support via certified teachers to students and families throughout the closure period (i.e., March-May). Call volume for the Homework Hotline was approximately 35 calls per week with average call time being approximately 19 minutes per call in March-May. To close the traditional school year and in alignment with the literacy priority, the District hosted a book giveaway of more than 1200 book sponsored by local community partners and shared summer reading lists with students and families.

Some of the challenges and prioritized needs presented to Shelby County Schools were as follows (Please note that this is not an exhaustive list.):

- Providing ALL subgroups of students, a quality education during the ongoing pandemic.
- Providing teachers with expectations to support continuous learning and instruction and meet the needs of all students.
- Providing teachers with differentiated professional learning to enhance content knowledge and instruction in the context of the actual materials used to meet the needs of all students.
- Continuing to support the Social-Emotional Learning needs during school closure for students.

Because of these prioritized needs and challenges, we have chosen to focus on technology, loss of instruction, and Personal Protective Equipment(PPE) in order to ensure our students and families have what they need to receive a quality and equitable education.

#### **Timeline**

The timeline for services provided to non-public schools spans from the time the grant application is approved and awarded until the conclusion of the grant period June 30, 2022. Services are currently being provided in the form of technical assistance to school officials as they plan for the use and budgeting of their allocations.

The timeline for services provided to public and charter schools spans from the time the grant application is approved and awarded until the conclusion of the grant period June 30, 2022.

#### **Budget & Spending Plan**

The CARES funds are not intended to replace state/local funding but instead are intended to provide additional funding to address emergent needs resulting from COVID-19. With school closure decisions, districts likely had unanticipated budget surpluses (i.e. operations, transportation) that should be repurposed to support other expenditures arising from COVID-19 (i.e. food services, paper, postage, etc.). The expectation for CARES funding is that it should be utilized primarily for re-opening and learning acceleration to address gaps resulting from school closure.

\* In what areas has the LEA experienced significant budget-to-actual differences in state/local funds?

In May, SCS amended the budget to forecast a realignment that adjusts expenditure savings to fund projected increases due to Covid-19.

Student Support decreased: Coordinated School Health decreased for supplemental nursing contracts and other services. Security contracted services decreased. Other reductions are related to travel, professional development and supplies for the closure of operations.

Transportation decreased as the contract for Durham and the related diesel fuel were halted as services were not performed due to the closure of school operations related to the pandemic.

\* How have these differences been repurposed to address related needs (i.e. custodial savings to sanitization costs, utilities and gas for buses (etc.) to nutrition).

Savings from transportation and student support will be repurposed to cover expenses to address loss instructional time or digital devices or internet service for students and teachers, and health/safety.

Student support includes Coordinated School Health, security contracted services, professional development, travel and supplies for the closure of operations savings

As specified in state statute, <u>our very first job on behalf of students is to keep them safe</u>. SCS is focused on our digital learning strategy. SCS is prioritizing spending on digital devices and network connectivity to ensure students and teachers can fully leverage online learning. We must reimagine our school calendar, not only for the 2021-22 school year, but for years into the future, as well.

\$4,604,407.19 will be spent on PPE and sanitation supplies to ensure safety of our students, teachers, staff, and District personnel.

\$1,803,733.00 will be spent on asset management system, replacement devices for students and technology infrastructure.

As school districts across the nation are making necessary accommodations to meet the needs of students beyond the classroom during the COVID-19 health crisis, Shelby County Schools (SCS) is making every effort to ensure that our students' education continues while students are at home during social distancing requirements. In addition to providing distance learning supports in the short-term, SCS plans to seize this moment to permanently close the digital divide and the academic gaps that our students have historically faced as a result of not having adequate tools to access online supports whether inside or outside of the classroom.

As such, the District plans to ensure access to quality instruction, beyond the COVID-19 response period, by providing digital devices to all Shelby County District Managed students. In addition to providing devices, SCS will provide internet connectivity resources to approximately 25% of students based on need. This bold and courageous plan moves SCS, over multiple years, to a true 1:1 district while ensuring equality and equity among students. The 1:1 initiative provides the necessary foundation for authentic blended learning. SCS will purchase an asset management system to support the1:1 initiative with carryover funds. Blended learning opens possibilities for students, allowing them to access a wide and rich pool of standards-aligned materials while still benefitting from teacher engagement and supports. The effectiveness of devices will be measured by academic gains achieved through this added resource, as well as the consistency of student engagement and interaction with these tools. In summary, purchasing these education technology supports with CARES funds will not only allow for the implementation of the appropriate health/safety measures during our continued pandemic response, but will minimize the amount of learning loss that could occur without these tools in place.

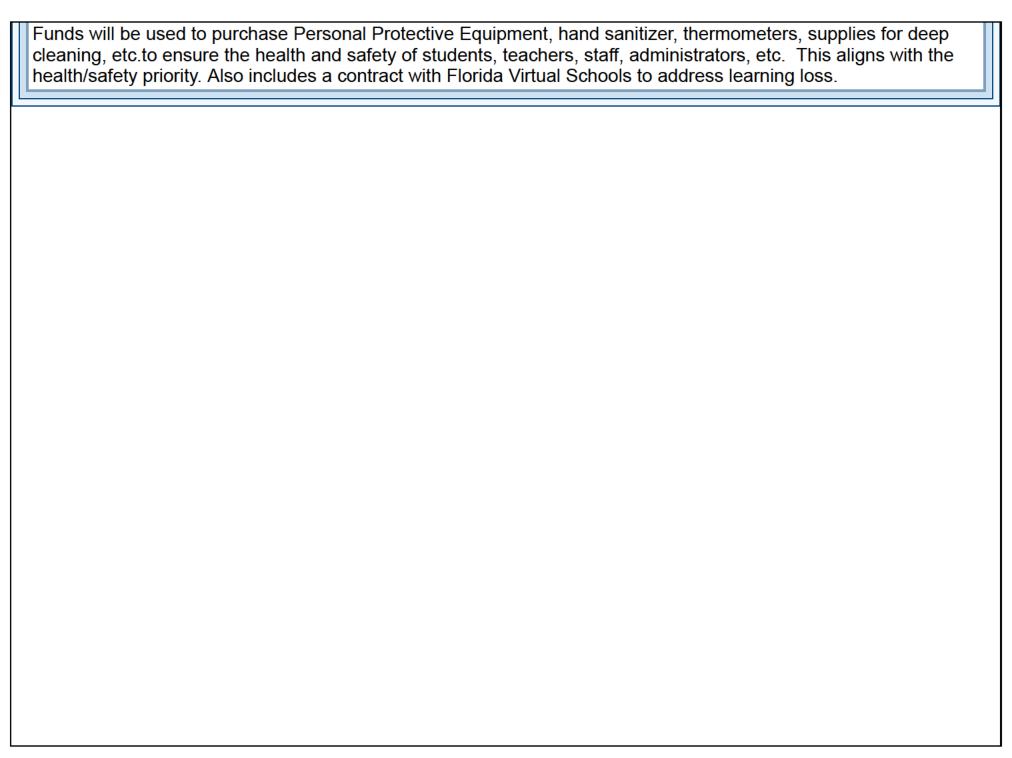

A virtual consultation meeting was held with private school officials on May 27, 2020. Notification of the meeting, as well as reminders, were sent to the non-public school officials via email. A make-up session was held on June 3, 2020. In preparation for the meetings, the presentation slides, the Local Education Agency Affirmation of Consultation with Non-Public School Officials Regarding the CARES Act/ESSER Fund form, the TDOE CARES Act Elementary and Secondary Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund Allowable Uses of Funds form and the needs assessment survey were provided via email in advance.

During the consultation meetings, all required topics indicated on the Local Education Agency Affirmation of Consultation with Non-Public School Officials Regarding the CARES Act/ESSER Fund were discussed. The process/formula used for determining the non-public schools proportionate share was presented in detail. Examples of calculations were provided and discussed, and the school officials were given the opportunity to ask questions. We also discussed allowable uses of funds and the needs assessment requirement. As an additional resource, school officials were provided with the TDOEs website address for the Coronavirus, as well as the US Department of Education's website address related to the Coronavirus. After the meeting, equitable services allocations were sent to the school officials participating in the CARES Act ESSER Fund.

Consultation continued as technical assistance was provided to school officials as they completed their needs assessments.

#### Update:

On September 25 and during the week of September 28, additional consultation meetings were held with all participating non-public schools to discuss the changes in non-public school allocations caused by recent legal developments. Discussions were held around the best method and data sources to utilize when calculating the proportionate share based on the Title I formula. Based on these discussions, the LEA and non-public schools agreed that the methods used to calculate the proportionate share would include, free and reduced lunch data, FACTS data, parent/family surveys, FAST data, financial aid data, SNAP and TNAF data. Based on this method, the adjusted allocation is \$1,016,855.98. See the Title I, Part A formula calculation worksheet and non-public school agreement forms uploaded to the Related Documents section.

#### Update FY'22:

FY'21 ESSER 1.0 carryover funds consultation meetings were held with non-public school officials. Based on school needs, expenditures will be made for items such as: student Chromebooks, laptops, and tablets, cleaning supplies, disposable face masks, hand sanitizer, additional classroom supplies to reduce transmission, online instructional programs to address learning loss, professional development on the integration and effective use of technology, air purifiers, additional small-group and/or one-on-one tutoring to address academic skill gaps.

The district will use these allocations towards supporting these needs and grow the academic achievement of our students.

### Summer Learning

The Summer Learning Academy is a four-week summer educational program, as part of the learning loss remediation and student acceleration program, that is designed to support student academic needs and remediate student learning loss. The SLA provides four weeks of additional reading and math instruction as well as intervention and activity for identified students. Students also participate in a STREAM course. The STREAM course provides remediation and engagement through programming in which students participate in real-world experiences and problem-solving across several content areas.

Students in grades 1-5 and 6-8 received explicit and systematic literacy, math, physical activity, and STREAM instruction to combat academic gaps acquired due to COVID 19 school closures. Teachers incorporated morning meeting and responsive classroom practices to promote the socio-emotional learning component. Will continue to build on the strengths of our Summer Learning Program for FY 2022.

### Additional Supports

Funds to address Learning Loss will also be used for online instructional resources, printing costs for learning packets, additional staff including teachers, interventionists, and educational assistants; implementation, expansion, or enhancement of learning supports; contracted services with school staff and vendors for counseling, technology coordination, and intervention; data analysis support; Extending school calendar; transportation costs associated with alternate schedules related to social distance requirements, stipends for staff providing before, afterschool and summer instruction and/or tutoring, extended school year instruction and additional RTI support and substitute teaching services. In addition to SCS administered surveys that provided all stakeholders an opportunity to feedback into ESSER funding, the district also held several events both in-person and virtually in which stakeholders could participate and provide feedback. These events included but were not limited to: County and City Commission meetings, Community Meetings, Board Work Sessions, Board Committee meetings, Board Business Meetings, Back-to-School Virtual Town Hall, and Parent Ambassador Orientation. These opportunities were shared in both English and Spanish across social media and the district website. Feedback was solicited and documented for each event. SCS stakeholder feedback was regularly reviewed by administration, assessed based on board adopted strategic initiatives, and aligned with state priorities of Academics, Student Readiness, Educators, and Foundations. Information was incorporated into the District's plan for ARP ESSER funds. Survey information is representative of the alignment of the final proposed plan submitted to the state.

During the month of April, the District hosted Community Input Sessions to inform the community of how ESSER funds can be utilized, under State guidance, and the District's proposal for allocating those funds to support students and schools. Input from those sessions was gathered through Q&A during the live attendance and online comments during the streamed sessions. These meetings took place at four different locations around the city and provided opportunities for parents to ask questions both in person and via live stream. In addition, Shelby County Schools distributed a survey, in English and Spanish, to our stakeholders to receive input into the outlined priorities for the

ARP ESSER funds. SCS is committed to listening and incorporating feedback from our stakeholders about the priorities that will best help us improve academic achievement in the year ahead. These responses were reviewed and analyzed to aid the district in developing the best plan to support those identified needs with ESSER funds.

Feedback was collected during open discussion at board meetings. At community meetings, note cards were distributed on which attendees could share feedback and questions. Additionally, a District email address was established to collect feedback. All submitted comments compiled were taken into consideration by the Finance Department.

In earlier meetings, discussions were aligned based on the components of the plan. All stakeholders and parents received a feedback card to place their questions. During the end of the presentation, those cards were collected and read aloud to ensure all questions were addressed. Translators were on hand as well to ensure all parents received the information with clarity. In addition, stakeholder feedback was collected from town hall meetings and a stakeholder survey.

As data were collected, the SCS Research and Performance management team organized the feedback into categories aligned to the categories within the ESSER application. In this way, SCS was able to determine the extent to which stakeholders had prioritized needs within each category and/or were out of alignment with the original proposed priorities. We used that information to have several priority re-set conversations ensuring that all decisions were driven by a compelling dataset related to student performance and need. In cases where we received narrative feedback, the SCS Research and Performance team performed a text analysis to align topics to the ESSER application categories.

We believe there is strong alignment between what our stakeholders prioritize and what we had anticipated. For stakeholder groups in which we were unable to engage a meaningful representative sample, we have plans to ensure engagement each quarter as we share outcomes achieved thus far, fine-tune implementation of strategies that are achieving appropriate traction, and reallocate to budget areas. Our stakeholders will determine a need based on data given the return to in-person instruction, such as student diagnostic and universal screener data, formative assessment data, social and emotional needs data, metal health and behavioral data, absenteeism data, COVID-related data, and educator/staff data.

### **Health & Safety**

Shelby County Schools adheres to guidance from local, state, and national educational and health authorities such as the Center for Disease Control (CDC), the Tennessee Department of Education, and the Shelby County Health Department, as well as employs augmented strategies tailored to the needs of the Shelby County Schools family of stakeholders.

Shelby County Schools has partnered with the local Health Department to ensure we have updated guidance and recommendations to mitigate and prevent the spread of COVID 19. The LEA and team also made sure that everyone was clear of the protocols through a repetition approach which included all learning styles. SCS made a conscious effort to utilize a variety of methods such as creating videos, hosting virtual sessions, guiding parents through the safety plan, and providing posters and visuals of the expectations for the safety strategies. The district is committed to keeping all employees, students, and constituents safe.

### **Academics**

Shelby County Schools is putting a strong focus on the academic achievement of our students through investing in educators, tutoring, supplemental curriculum, and other positions in support of student academic achievement. Through our needs assessment and stakeholder feedback, we determined that we needed to intensify our tutoring programs, increase the number of interventionists serving our students, and reinforce our efforts toward early reading. The district will use these allocations towards supporting these needs and grow the academic achievement of our students

The Summer Learning Academy is a four-week summer educational program, as part of the learning loss remediation and student acceleration program, that is designed to support student academic needs and remediate student learning loss. The SLA provides four weeks of additional reading and math instruction as well as intervention and activity for identified students. Students also participate in a STREAM course. The STREAM course provides

remediation and engagement through programming in which students participate in real-world experiences and problem-solving across several content areas.

### **Student Readiness**

Shelby County Schools understands the importance of supporting the whole child, not just academics. Through analysis of our needs and our stakeholder feedback, the district has allocated ESSER funds in support of the needs of our faculty, staff, and students. Our areas of focus within this category are high school innovation, the mental health of our students, families, faculty, and staff, and advanced placement and dual credit enrollment courses.

### **Educators**

Shelby County Schools understands that valuing and supporting our educators yields high quality student academic performance and a well-rounded student body, not to mention a happy, satisfied workforce. Through analysis of our needs and stakeholder feedback related to the impact that COVID-19 has had on our educators, we have prioritized the following areas to support with ESSER funds: class size reduction, strategically recruiting and retaining high-quality teachers, increasing the number of teacher assistants. We believe that through these initiatives by means of the ESSER funds, the district can help bolster our teachers as they take on the monumental task of supporting students with learning loss and prepare them to achieve the rigorous standards that they are charged with learning all while they are also preparing them for success in life.

Moreover, our quarterly systems that will be in place will track our students' performance, and progress as it relates to their academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs.

- 4. Charter schools will receive reimbursements within three business days of the LEA receiving the reimbursement request allocation from the Tennessee Department of Education.
- 5. Charter plans submitted to the LEA must be approved within five business days and any non-approved plan must be sent Tennessee Department of Education, Division of Federal Programs and Oversight for a third-party review.
- 1. LEAs must develop and make publicly available their *ARP ESSER Funding Application* no later than **Aug. 1**, **2021**. All plans must be made publicly available on the LEA's website and published on the Tennessee Department of Education's (department) website within thirty (30) days of approval.
- 2. All plans must be developed with meaningful public consultation with stakeholder groups (i.e., families, students, teachers, principals, school and district administrators, school leaders, other educators, school staff, advocacy organizations representing student groups). The consultation process must include an opportunity for input and meaning consideration of that input.
- 3. ESSER plans must be in an understandable and uniform format; to the extent practicable, written in a language that parents can understand or, if not practicable, orally interpreted; and upon request by a parent who is an individual with a disability, provided in an accessible format to that parent.
- 4. LEAs must **update** the *Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan* **at least every six months** through **Sept. 30, 2023**, seek public input on the plan and any revisions, and take such input into account. All revisions must include an explanation and rationale of why the revisions were made.
